

"Sinauli Speaks – Unearthing India's Indigenous Civilizational Roots Beyond the Aryan Invasion Myth"

In continuation of its civilisational discourse on **Identity, Culture, and History**, the **World Intellectual Foundation (WIF)** organised a thought-provoking panel discussion titled "Sinauli Speaks: Unearthing India's Indigenous Civilizational Roots Beyond the Aryan Invasion Myth (4,000 Years Ago, India Rode Chariots – Sinauli Redefines Our Past)" on **October 9, 2025**, at **Dr. Ambedkar International Centre (DAIC), New Delhi**.

The discussion brought together eminent archaeologists, historians, and thought leaders to deliberate on the **archaeological discoveries at Sinauli (Baghpat, Uttar Pradesh)** — a site that has reshaped our understanding of ancient India and its indigenous continuity.

The session began with a **welcome address** by **Col. Akash Patil**, Director, DAIC, followed by an introduction of the esteemed guests and panelists by **Ms. Hemangi Sinha**, Project Head, WIF.

The highlight of the event was the **Keynote Address** by **Shri Ram Bahadur Rai**, President, IGNCA Trust, who eloquently emphasised that the true search for our *civilisational self* must be grounded in archaeology and authentic indigenous narratives. He underscored that discoveries like Sinauli allow India to move beyond myth-based constructs such as the *Aryan Invasion Theory*, offering instead a framework of cultural and civilisational continuity.

The panel discussion featured two of India's foremost archaeologists — Dr. B. R. Mani (Former Director General, ASI) and Dr. Sanjay Kumar Manjul (Additional Director General, ASI, and lead excavator of Sinauli). Moderated by Ms. Hemangi Sinha, the dialogue explored the technological, ritualistic, and cultural significance of Sinauli's findings — including copper-plated chariots, wooden coffins, weaponry, shields, and ritual artefacts — and their implications for reinterpreting early Indian history.

The conversation also delved into the larger historical context — connecting **Sinauli with the Late Harappan and Ochre Coloured Pottery (OCP) cultures**, challenging the so-called *Dark Age Theory*, and reimagining the timeline of India's indigenous civilisation as a continuum rather than a series of ruptures.

In his concluding remarks, Shri Rai urged scholars and institutions to **anchor India's identity discourse in evidence-based scholarship**, while celebrating the nation's *spiritual depth*, *craftsmanship*, *and intellectual resilience*.

The event concluded with a **Vote of Thanks** by **Shri Sudhanshu Mittal**, Founder, World Intellectual Foundation, who highlighted the importance of such academic dialogues in shaping a self-assured and knowledge-driven Bharat. This was followed by **high tea and networking**, where scholars, students, and dignitaries interacted and shared reflections on the day's discussions.
